

Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA)

The Toxic Substances Control Act 1976 (TSCA) is a US law passed in 1976 and administered by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The EPA evaluates potential risks from new and existing chemicals in order to prevent or reduce harmful environmental impacts. TSCA prohibits the production or import of five chemicals including articles containing these substances:

- Phenol, isopropylated phosphate (3:1) (PIP (3:1)) CAS 68937-41-7 (complete ban)
- Decabromodiphenyl ether (DecaBDE) CAS 1163-19-5 (complete ban)
- 2,4,6-Tris(tert-butyl) phenol (2,4,6-TTBP) CAS 732-26-3 (limit value = 0,3% w/w)
- Hexachlorobutadiene (HCBd) CAS 87-68-3 (complete ban)
- Pentachlorothiophenol (PCTP) CAS 133-49-3 (limit value = 1% w/w)
